10. VAIL RECREATION DISTRICT EMPLOYERS AMENDED AND RESTATED PENSION TRUST PLAN

10.1. Mr. Ortiz stated the Vail Recreation District's intent to form a pension board composed of VRD employees to oversee the VRD retirement plan. Upon a motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously RESOLVED to approve the Vail Recreation District Employers Amended and Restated Pension Trust Plan effective Aug. 1, 2016.

11. VAIL GOLF CLUB DRIVING RANGE CONCEPT REVIEW

11.1. Mr. Ortiz reviewed a concept for the Vail Golf Club driving range. The concept would include a releveling, soil amendment and a sand cap plan to create a better growing environment for the driving range turf. There will also be a 1 percent slope to the range to create a better safety environment and make it harder to hit balls over the driving range net. Staff are also recommending adding target greens to the range at various distances. After some discussion, the board expressed their desire for staff to continue moving forward on this concept.

12. DOBSON ICE ARENA USE AGREEMENT

12.1. Mr. Ortiz asked the board to review the amended use agreement with small changes to address items such as adding notice to not bring outside alcohol into the facility, some changes in payment terms and other minimal updates. By motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously RESOLVED to approve the Dobson Ice Arena Use Agreement as presented.

13. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR INPUT

- 13.1. Mr. Ortiz wanted to remind everyone that the Kids Adventure Games is going on now in Vail. The race is sold out, but there is a waiting list and the VRD is looking for volunteers to assist with this fun event.
- 13.2. Mr. Ortiz also encouraged everyone to play golf at the Vail Golf Club. There has been overwhelmingly positive response to the course conditions and staff service level.
- 13.3. Mr. Ortiz stated that summer programs are winding down and school-year programs will be starting up soon.

GYMNASTICS REVENUES- Numbers are on the rebound, good numbers from the summer camps as well.

DOBSON REVENUES- Programs, Food& Beverage, and programs all doing well.

GOLF REVENUES- Down from last year but ahead of budget.

PUBLIC RELATIONS EXPENSES- Changeover of personnel and timing of expenses.

GOLF OPERATIONS EXPENSES- Savings in building operations, staffing, and advertising.

CAPITAL- Projects to date under budget but additional clubhouse costs not yet billed by TOV.

GOLF EXPENSES- Generally timing variances as snow delayed purchases and ramp up of operations.

FUND BALANCE- Savings at end of 2015 rolled forward to 2016.

VAIL RECREATION DISTRICT DIRECTOR REPORTS August 11, 2016

GOLF

- This past week was busy with tournaments at the Vail GC, as we hosted three events. We hosted the Vail Mountain School Boy's High School Invitational on Monday. We had a record number of participants, with 95 players'. Battle Mountain High School took home first place. VMS came in fourth. Tuesday, we had a corporate group of 36 players. Thursday, we hosted the BBB Tom Slaughter Tournament. Thank you to Allison Wadey from the Vail Chamber as well as all our VRD Staff who helped organize the event. We had several VRD Staff volunteer their time at the course with set up, take down, including cart and course cleanup. Thank you! We hosted 22 teams and sold more tee signs than the previous two years.
- We are starting to pack up the modular as we will move out next week.
 We will store all our remaining inventory. Everything is 50% off now in the golf shop! Operations will continue out of our snack shack/ starter building for October.
- Aerification of the golf course started today. We have the schedule posted throughout the starter area.
- Nathan Mead, our Head Professional will compete in our PGA West Chapter 2-day Chapter Championship on Monday and Tuesday.
- The golf course has continued to be busy in September. Our tee times are beginning at 9:30 am now, to allow for our frosty mornings. We plan to move this to 10:00am the end of the month. We will be closed for one day on October 3rd to allow for green aerification.
- We are starting to meet with our sales reps for our Spring/Summer orders.
 Staff will attend our Fall Merchandise Show in October as well.

GOLF MAINTENANCE

- We are beginning to aerate fairways and tees today, with the back 9 holes to be completed this week and the front 9 holes next week. Greens will be aerated and deep-tined on October 3rd.
- Irrigation system back on line following lightning strike in mid-August. As
 a side benefit to this unfortunate event, the time consuming process of
 trouble shooting all decoders and sprinklers on the course for lightning
 damage has allowed us to update our irrigation maps with Larry Rodgers
 Design, as changes and renovations to holes 12/19 and 18 had not been
 updated previously.
 - An insurance claim for new parts and hardware may be necessary, so we are documenting expenses.

- We will be following up with Rainbird tech support to assess what we can do to avoid this kind of damage in the future.
- Work continues on the clubhouse/old 18 area, with landscape and drip irrigation installation, planting of new trees and shrubs, and topsoil distribution progressing.
- Gore Creek has now dropped below the 30 c.f.s. mark over the past two
 weeks, restricting irrigation to our roughs and driving range to 50% of
 replacement E.T., per our agreement with ERWSD. With warm weather
 and not much rain lately, we are starting to see areas of the course drying
 out. Gore Creek was nearing 30 c.f.s. on 8/22, so we did well to go a
 month before restrictions began to have an effect.
 - Additionally, with the low creek flow, we are no longer able to keep the ponds on holes 2 and 8 full by filling them from our irrigation system.
- Still considering a permit to remove some trees along left sides of holes 8,
 11, and 12, where overcrowding due to planting too closely many years ago is negatively impacting tree health.
- Projects in progress, or soon to be started:
 - Cart path crack sealing and overlays may be accomplished, but not until October. The asphalt contractors were just not available to us this year due to the high volume of road and highway projects in the valley this season.
 - Staining of wooden bridges and other wood components and facilities.

SPORTS REPORT

- Another summer of events is in the books. We finished the Trail Running Series with a great Evergold Course, followed by breakfast at Mountain Plaza and awarding of race and series champions. We also recognized those who completed all 7 races.
- We finished the bike season with (2) Cyclocross races while lightly attended as in the past, fun was had by all participants and spectators
- Fall leagues are underway with 7 teams playing 8v8 Coed soccer and nine flag football teams. Volleyball will start soon in Red Sandstone gym.
- We will be producing and helping out with some upcoming events the Great Stampede 1 mile and 5 K race at Wild West Days, a middle school xcountry meet in Eagle Vail with our program and a few visiting teams, and the Zombie Run benefiting BMHS FBLA.
- One more big event on the field that will be the Vail Valley Soccer Club tournament on 9/30-10/1. There are over 140 teams scheduled to play in the tournament.

MARKETING

- Jessie put a lot of work into the Businesses, Bogeys and Bragging Rights golf tournament that took place on Sept. 15 at the Vail Golf Club. We had 22 teams participate (more than 2015) and sold four times as many tee signs sponsorships as last year. We also had over 70 raffle prize donations from local businesses and 20 silent auction items that brought in very high bids. A big thanks to Alison Wadey and the staff and board at the Vail Chamber and Business Association for helping to co-produce this event, all of the VRD staff who assisted in soliciting teams, donations and helping on tournament day, and all of the local businesses and individuals who generously donated raffle prizes and silent auction items, purchased tee signs and played in the tournament. It was a great event and team effort with all the proceeds going toward the VRD's Tom Slaughter Jr. Memorial Fund, which gives scholarships to local youth to participate in VRD programs.
- Jessie helped with the Town of Vail 50th birthday party and promotion of the Zeke M. Pierce skatepark dedication and grand opening, both very successful events.
- Jessie hired a new Communications and Graphic Design Specialist, Nell Davis, who started on Monday.
- Press releases and emails were sent out for the EverGold and 10K@10,000 feet trail races, two cyclocross races, Beaver Creek Blast mountain bike race, Dobson fall skating and hockey programs, BB&B tournament information, team and sponsor solicitations, KEEN Family Mud Run information, youth soccer registration, and Kids Adventure Games information, as well as assisting gymnastics on starting up their weekly emails again for the fall.
- The VRD was featured numerous times in the Vail Daily recently including a front page photo of the 10@10,000 feet trail race, plus stories about the Businesses, Bogeys and Bragging Rights tournament, skatepark grand opening, cyclocross races, mountain bike results, some town talk and Top 2 mentions, plus daily calendar events.
