Dear Vail Recreation Board of Directors:

We are changing our name to **Vail Valley Mountain Trails Alliance (VVMTA)** to reflect the inclusiveness of all the trails we volunteer on. Our mission since our beginning in 2011 has been to maintain, upgrade and build trails for all users including hikers, dog walkers, runners, bikers, equestrians, snow-shoers and cross-country skiers. Vail Recreation District's (VRD) valuable contribution to trails and its partnership has expanded and improved trail use and access for locals and visitors alike.

Each year we need to raise \$50,000 to fund our Adopt A Trail (AAT) and other trails programs. In 2018, the AAT program and VVMTA completed over 3,500 hours of trail maintenance on trails throughout Eagle County. This equates to \$86,415 of volunteer time, not including any related overhead costs. Many of the volunteers spending their time and energy on these trails are VRD employees, local taxpayers, and participants in many of VRD's programs and race series. Not to mention, many of the trails maintained are included in VRD's mountain bike and trail running race series.

We write now requesting VRD to include \$2,000.00 in your annual budget for the Eagle County Trail Fund. Trail maintenance in Eagle County is critical to maintain our trail systems as an important economic driver, improve health and wellness, and quality of life benefit for our community.

Additionally, in 2018 the AAT program launched the Trail Ambassador program which stationed volunteers at trailheads with Seasonal Wildlife Closures. This new program resulted in over 400 trail users being contacted at these trailheads and educated as to why they are closed for calving and critical winter wildlife habitat.

We are dependent on donations and grants for our funding. Our approximate annual expenditures for funding a Forest Service Seasonal Ranger (\$23,000), a Trails Project Coordinator (\$18,500-), plus tools, supplies and overhead (\$5,000-) totaling \$46,500-. Individuals, Towns, and Metropolitan Districts have donated these funds. A list of donors is included in our 2017 Final Season Review, a copy of which we will deliver to your office along with maps of current projects.

Our trail work throughout Eagle County benefits all locals and tourists. Our continuing work is to create trails that connect communities enabling users to travel on soft-surface trails from town to town, subdivision to subdivision, with minimum need to travel on asphalt.

In 2018, our volunteers in cooperation with the Forest Service constructed the Everkrisp Trail connecting the EagleVail Community trail system to Meadow Mountain. VRD constituents, participants, and supporters will certainly enjoy this link to Meadow Mountain Trails. This trail also opens the opportunity to connect a soft-surface trail system from Avon to EagleVail and ultimately Minturn, and Vail.

Our Valley's summer season only becomes a more important time of the year for our community, for businesses, and even more so for our guests. Our recent designation as one of only fifteen IMBA Silver Level Ride Centers in the world, shows the importance and opportunities that trails provide our community. As we move forward, the tentacles of our valley wide trail system will link communities and provide summer recreational opportunities for all.

To accomplish all of our work we need your financial help. As we expand our work we are looking forward to annually raising enough money through donations and grants to employ a full-time Executive Director, however for now our team of volunteers is committed to continuing trail work and partnership with all communities.

VAIL RECREATION DISTRICT DIRECTOR REPORTS January 24, 2019

MARKETING

- Marketing is working on the year in review, with input from each department and director.
 We are also already starting on summer collateral, including the all-VRD summer brochure,
 the trail running postcard/magnet and a youth sports camp brochure.
- Numerous ads have been placed in local and state publications for the Nordic Center, Vail
 Grail series, summer camps and the trail running series. Jessie is working on an updated
 digital advertising plan to better encompass all that VRD has to offer in summer.
- Thrice-weekly advertising continues in the Vail Daily, highlighting the Nordic Center, Vail Grail series, Imagination Station, open gyms and special events/upcoming programs.
- The VRD sent out a reminder to local users to go online and complete the EngageVail.com survey to give input on the Lionshead Civic Area Plan. Reminder that the survey closes tomorrow (Friday, January 25), if you haven't already completed it.
- Nell has been creating a number of registration forms and flyers for all the youth sports
 programs, a new Family Tech Night program at the Imagination Station, winter break and
 January camps, the Vail Sweater Run, Vail Grail series, Nordic rental and equipment forms,
 sports department sponsor recap designs and more.
- Jessie is working with the Nordic Center to implement a customer contact strategy and capture guest information in order to survey guests after their visit.

GOLF MAINTENANCE

- Nordic grooming operations are going well with no equipment issues of late and a great snowpack.
- Our settled snowpack stands at 26" at our monitoring station next to #3 green. There are areas out on the property that are deeper than that, and some areas that are less than that.
- Bridge work on 14 and 15 wrapped up for the season the Friday right before Christmas, after which time we resumed our normal Nordic trail corridor through the areas that had been closed to Nordic users to allow for construction traffic. Those areas have improved since initial opening as more snow has continued to add to the base.
- Our new John Deere 835i tracked utility vehicle was delivered around Christmas and has been used exclusively for rolling out snowshoe trails while the older unit is now a backup unit kept at the maintenance shop. Both vehicles will go into service during the golf season.
- Golf course putting greens have been "potholed" for visual inspection on multiple occasions, the last being December 20. We went under permanent snowcover the first week of November and continue to see a healthy, sugary snow pack continue to build and preside over greens surfaces with no ice layers observed. Continued observations will be done over the remainder of the winter, especially if we see a drastic change in temperatures, to ensure the greens continue to be in a healthy dormant winter state.
- Scott will be attending the annual Golf Industry Show from February 4-7 in San Diego. He
 will be taking seminars on Monday and Tuesday, and attending the trade show on
 Wednesday and Thursday to look for innovative equipment and products to add to, and
 improve, our operations.
- Construction/renovation work on the driving range tee and #15 tee complex was wrapped up for the season in late November with both projects in good standing for next spring restarts.

Timelines for completion and opening to play will be determined by length of winter and corresponding conditions in the spring for remobilization.

GOLF

- We have five PGA PGM interns committed to working with us at the Vail Golf Club this summer. Jesse Campbell, who worked with us last season on a three-month internship has decided to return for his six-month internship this summer. We are excited to have Jesse back as he is an enthusiastic, dedicated and intelligent young man. We have worked out housing for our interns with Vail Realty.
- Staff will attend the annual PGA Merchandise show in Florida during the week of January 21. Alice has set up several appointments with golf vendors and salespeople to place final orders for the 2019 season.
- The Nordic Center is doing well! We have slowed down a bit since the holidays but still have steady traffic. Positive compliments have been pouring in from our locals and guest on the quality of the track and our beautiful facility. Guests are enjoying the Grill on the Gore as well. It is refreshing to have the continuity between all areas of our operation with the Vail Recreation District operating year-round.
- Alice has been nominated for the Merchandiser of the Year Award for the PGA West Chapter of Colorado. The awards will be presented in April. Alice will complete an application for the award and the Board of Directors will decide the winners. The Vail Golf Club had an amazing retail year in that we basically had three months of selling and grossed roughly \$214,000. These numbers for the size of our shop is strong. With the damaged greens and opening all 18 holes on July 2, we had the golf traffic from early July through September.
- We are planning for the 2019 golf season now. We have booked some groups for the summer. We released our RFP for a donated golf tournament for a non-profit organization in Eagle County. The proposals are due February 15 and the decision for the donated tournament will be mid-March.

SPORTS

- Winter indoor volleyball league has started at Homestake Peak with 11 teams and adult basketball league continues with seven teams.
- Adult open gyms continue with basketball on Mondays, soccer on Tuesdays and volleyball
 on Fridays from 6:30-9:30 p.m. at Homestake Peak School. It is important for the public to
 check the website for updates as the programming is not nearly as consistent as in the past
 due to sharing the gym with middle school sports.
- Youth futsal begins this week for 3-5 graders and the 1-2 grade session starts next week.
- Registration is underway for High Country Hoops which begins in February for kids in first through fifth grade.
- The Bloch and Chapleau Vail Grail Winter Race Series begins this week with the citizens
 Nordic race at Maloit Park. The race is in conjunction with the Battle Mountain High School
 and middle school Nordic races, which the sports department is also timing. Thanks in
 advance to Mike Ortiz and Jim Sanders for volunteering to help.
- New sponsors of the Vail Grail series include Sync, who is contributing \$500 in product, and Sportea, who will be providing hydration products.
- Planning continues for summer events and partnership renewals.

- Beth and Kip will be attending the Outdoor Retailer trade show in Denver at the end of the month and will be meeting with potential title sponsors for the trail running series.
- Kip made his refereeing debut at the Homestake Peak sixth grade girls' basketball game this week.

DOBSON

- Dobson is moving along with another set of Yeti games. They don't stop. Attendance has been good and the atmosphere has been electric.
- Learn to skate has started and we have 34 kids participating in our basic skills classes.
- Attendance for Story Time Skate has been consistent with close to seven kids regularly attending.
- Youth hockey is hot right now. We have 21 girls playing in our Intro to Girls Hockey program.
 Ages range from seven to 10 years old. We have 77 U8 hockey players which makes for 98 kids playing youth hockey in VRD programs.
- Currently we have 27 registrants for Bob Johnson Hockey School. This is a huge number considering we are only half way through January. Our capacity is 90 skaters.

NORDIC

- Nordic, snowshoe and fat bike trails are in excellent condition due to recent snowfall and grooming.
- The Nordic Center Demo Day is scheduled for Saturday, January 19 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.
- Sales, service and lessons have been extremely busy.
- Staff just completed a skate training and classic training clinic.

- Yeti has been strong this year with increase in attendees and increase in number of home games.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

- Imagination Station traffic was very busy over the holidays. Fortunately, we had two staff on our very busy days and experienced staff on all days. We saw 60 to 100 people every day over the holiday break and we were busy with Paint Your Own Pottery, art, and virtual reality. Traffic dropped the second week in January, but we are still seeing 20 to 60 people every morning. We have sold quite a few annual memberships in the month of December also. Winter hours continue: Imagination Station 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., seven days per week. The studio, including pottery, art, VR and sand pendulum will be open 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. We began evening hours on Friday, January 18 with our Family Tech Nights. We have many birthday parties scheduled throughout January and February.
- We hosted the Cocktails & Canvas event, Lantern Painting, in partnership with AIPP on December 21. This is the one all-ages event of the year. We had a full-house of 39 participants and sold the most drinks yet. The fifth Cocktails & Canvas will be Tuesday, February 12, Chocolate Making with Felicia of Cornerstone Chocolates. This will sell out its capacity of 20.
- KidZone After School has 15-25 children per day fewer than we are accustomed to seeing.
 We initiated a KidZone Nordic program on Tuesdays and we are seeing a lot of customers who we were not seeing prior to the program. We have 18 to 20 Nordic skiers with eight to ten non-skiers on Tuesdays.

- We support Youth Power 365 PwrHrs by coaching Nordic in conjunction with SSCV on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons. This program has about 40 children; we coach Nordic to about 15 each day (roughly ten children do PwrHrs but do not do Nordic for various reasons). Close to 20 of the participants are first graders who previously had not been invited to participate in PwrHrs.
- We hosted eight days of School's Out Camp over the holiday break, then hosted another day on Monday, January 21. We were near capacity the first week of holiday break, and at capacity the second week. As expected, we had about half of that number for the Jan. 21 single-day camp. Additionally, the shuttle was a huge success and our after-school shuttle numbers have increased since the break. Thanks to summer staff Amberlyn, Marisol, Fanny and Sarah H. for helping over the holidays!
- Jessie and Nell supported Family Tech Nights at Imagination Station by making a flyer and sending out an email blast.

GYMNASTICS

- The competitive level 6 through level 10's traveled to Anaheim, California to attend the California Grand Invitational. Our level 10, Samantha Nothnagel, placed seventh overall out of 20+ senior division level 10's.
- The competitive team will travel to The Broadmoor in Colorado Springs for their next competition on February 8-10.
